## Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking Statement

This statement is made pursuant to s.54 of the Modern Slavery Act 2015. It sets out the Centura Group's actions to understand potential modern slavery risks related to its business and to put in place steps aimed at minimising this risk.

This mandatory statement issued by Centura relates to business dealings during the **financial year 1<sup>st</sup> July 2024 to 30<sup>th</sup> June 2025**.

## Our Commitment

As part of the specialist construction industry, we recognise that we have a responsibility to take a robust approach to slavery and human trafficking risks. The Centura Group is absolutely committed to preventing slavery and human trafficking in its corporate activities and its supply chain.

## Reports and issues dealt with in 2024-25

There were no allegations or reports of potential modern slavery in the financial year 2024-25.

## Company Structure and Supply Chains

The Centura Group employs over 360 people and comprises the following companies:

<b>Concrete Repairs Limited (CRL)</b>	was founded in 1954 as a specialist contracting company and accounts for roughly 90% of the value of the Group. Over the past 70 years the business has maintained this specialist classification providing a comprehensive asset management and maintenance service to various private and public clients. CRL operates in various sectors, including highways, marine, water, heritage, car parks, building and rail.
<b>CRL Surveys</b>	undertakes condition surveys and reports of existing concrete structures.
<b>F J Samuely and Partners</b>	is a structural Consulting Engineer. <i>[Left the Centura Group 01 August 2024]</i>
<b>Lifespan Structures</b>	designs, manufactures and supplies FRP composite bridge decks.
<b>Centura</b>	centrally manages HR, finance and training functions for the Group.
<b>Remedial and Surveys PTY LTD</b>	founded in 2024, is an Australian asset repair company that specialises in condition surveys and concrete repairs. <i>[Joined the Centura Group 09 October 2024]</i> The statement does not currently cover the activities of this company.

We work with over 800 suppliers including consultants, specialist material manufacturers, subcontractors and labour agencies.



### Countries of Operation and Supply

Centura's workload is almost entirely within the United Kingdom, other than the Australian branch of CRL.

### Risk Assessment of Current Activities

The following activities are considered medium risk of slavery or human trafficking:

- The use of agency workers for labour intensive activities.
- Subcontractor packages with high labour content, especially where overseas operatives may be used – this tends to be most relevant to CRL's operations.
- The source of raw materials for the products we use, where materials are obtained and what the slavery and human trafficking situation is in these areas/companies. Potential higher risk materials identified are anodes that require specific metals for manufacture and are often imported from around the world.

### Procurement and our Supply Chain

We believe the highest potential risk sits within our supply chain. Most of our products and services are purchased from UK or EU based firms who are also required to comply with the requirements of the UK Modern Slavery Act, 2015 or similar legislation in EU states.

Where possible we build longstanding and collaborative relationships with our suppliers to ensure they align with our values and that they are aware of our commitment to protect human rights. As part of our procurement approval process, we ask our suppliers to provide information about their own Modern Slavery policies and arrangements regardless of whether modern slavery is deemed to be a high risk in the procurement of a specific product or service.

80% of our supply chain have a Modern Slavery policy.

### Responsibility

Responsibility for the Company's anti-slavery and anti-human trafficking initiatives is as follows:

- **Policies:** The Board of Directors is responsible for putting these policies and procedures in place. In order to do so, the Board will rely upon Directors and Senior Management to review company processes and in its supply chains. The Board of Directors is responsible for reviewing this policy in line with current requirements (legislation and PPN).
- **Risk Assessments:** The responsibility for human rights and modern slavery risk analysis lies with the Directors and Senior Managers within the company.
- **Training:** Awareness and employee responsibilities training will be organised by the Training Manager.

### Relevant Policies

We operate the following policies that refer to our approach to the identification of modern slavery risks and steps to be taken to prevent slavery and human trafficking in its operations. These documents are held in the Centura Document Library:

Directors and Senior Management will revisit and develop these policies and procedures regularly and initiate any necessary revisions.



Training

We propose to increase awareness by way of a combination of:

- Organised training
- Toolbox talks
- Induction training
- Signage, Posters and access to other information (at our offices and worksites, on company intranet)
- Consultation meetings
- Focussed awareness and information share with Supply Chain
- Stand down and supply chain days which will include focus on Modern Slavery issues.

Due Diligence

The Company undertakes due diligence when considering taking on new suppliers, and regularly reviews its existing suppliers. Our due diligence and risk management measures include:

- Consider the supply chain broadly to assess particular product or geographical risks of modern slavery and human trafficking.
- Request information from our supply chain in relation to their modern slavery and human trafficking policies and procedures.
- Use of online sites including Companies House and UKAS Cert Check to check member information.
- Credit Checks.
- Employee awareness of modern slavery and human trafficking.
- Supply chain awareness of modern slavery and human trafficking.

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### Key Actions Planned for the 2025-26 Year

- Review of our **global material supply chain** and Modern Slavery risks, eg producers of anodes.
- Supply Chain mapping.
- Provide internal **guidance** for what to do if you think someone is at risk.
- Continue Modern Slavery **training** and awareness.
- Continue **review of our supply chain verification** to identify any additional opportunities to evaluate both existing and potential suppliers.
  
- Align with current TISC requirements and PPN 009 Guidance, including:
  - Review how we **identify and manage risks** in both new procurement activity and existing contracts
  - Develop how we assess the risk of modern slavery in procurements, noting characteristics and current key sectors of concern
  - Ensure we have a mechanism to provide supply chain information for new procurements designated as having a high risk of modern slavery
  - Review enhanced due diligence activities and exclusion grounds
